SUBJECT: Black History Month

In February we celebrate Black History Month, reflecting on the progress, richness, and diversity of African-American achievements. Although February has been designated as the official month to celebrate Black history, every day is an occasion to highlight the monumental significance of African-American contributions and the vital role they have played in shaping America's history. Black history and American history are woven together.

Black History Month provides an opportunity to raise awareness of the *Black Heritage* commemorative stamp series and the 2001 honoree, Roy Wilkins. The U.S. Postal Service is committed to this popular stamp series, which helps educate Americans on the achievements and contributions of noted African-American leaders, inventors, educators, scientists, entrepreneurs, entertainers, and sports figures.

We encourage you to host special events in your community throughout the month of February, highlighting Roy Wilkins and the *Black Heritage* series. Take advantage of Black History Month by inspiring both children and adults to learn more about African-American history through the educational hobby of stamp collecting.

The *Roy Wilkins* stamp will be issued on January 24, 2001, and Black History Month launches nationally on February 1. The enclosed tool kit provides a step-by-step guide to help you plan your local Black History Month and *Roy Wilkins* second-day events and activities. The kit includes the following:

- Suggestions to generate publicity.
- Fill-in news releases for Black History Month events.
- A letter to the editor you can send to local newspapers announcing Black History Month/Roy Wilkins second-day ceremonies/events.
- · Sample media advisory, public service announcement, and thank-you notes.
- · Talking points for a speech to be given during local community events.
- · Public Affairs and Government Relations contacts.

# **National Black History Month**

# Publicity Ideas to Interest the Media

February is Black History Month

There are many ways to interest local media in your Black History Month/Roy Wilkins second-day stamp events. Here are some methods to capture a reporter's attention:

Note: Black History Month events can be planned in conjunction with Roy Wilkins second-day stamp ceremonies. Although your event can raise awareness about the Black Heritage stamp series, please ensure that Roy Wilkins is the primary focus.

- Have a month-long Black History Month celebration involving employees and their families, school children, and congressional, civic, and community leaders. Involve those people in helping create a traveling or permanent African-American stamp collection exhibit that could either be placed in post office lobbies or taken to stamp events at libraries, schools, or museums throughout the month of February. Highlight a different honoree theme every week of the month. Some examples of different themes might include sports figures, entertainers, inventors, educators, leaders, and scientists.
  - Photo opportunity: Encourage media to cover the opening day of your exhibit. Media can take pictures of employees and community members setting up the exhibit to accompany an article about Black History Month.
  - Opening day of exhibit can include Roy Wilkins and the Black Heritage series stamp unveiling ceremony. Ask congressional, civic, and community leaders to participate in ceremonies.
- Invite local children to design stamps about African American history, and display their designs in the post office. Have local customers select the winners. Winners can be awarded Black Heritage or other commemorative stamp materials.
- Using this kit, spread the word about Black History Month and Roy Wilkins in your community by giving presentations and workshops to local elementary schools, library reading clubs, and community organizations like the Scouts and the Rotary Club.
- Look for opportunities to partner with local philatelic organizations that may be sponsoring local exhibits or second-day events. Offer to speak or conduct workshops, or organize volunteers from among your staff to help.

■ Help local after-school programs set up stamp-collecting clubs and share African-American history. Ask a local stamp collector to set up a display of stamp-collecting tools and philatelic materials, such as tongs, magnifier, perforation gauge, albums, first-day covers, and so on. Go online to the American Philatelic Society's Web site at <a href="https://www.stamps.org">www.stamps.org</a> to find local chapters (including African-American stamp clubs) and affiliates that might be willing to help.

Implement any of these ideas, combine them, or brainstorm with your employees and come up with ideas of your own. Be sure to publicize each and every event to your local newspaper, radio, and television stations via press releases, media advisories, and letters to the media contained in this publicity kit. Don't forget to make follow-up telephone calls.

### Black Heritage Series (1978 - 2001)

Harriet Tubman (February 1, 1978)

Born a slave, abolitionist Tubman was the first African-American woman to be honored on a U.S. stamp, and the first honoree in the *Black Heritage* series. Tubman was the conductor for the famed Underground Railroad by which many slaves escaped to freedom in the years leading to the Civil War.

Martin Luther King, Jr. (January 13, 1979)

King is considered one of the most powerful and popular leaders of the African-American Civil Rights movement of the 1950s and 1960s. He spearheaded a massive peace movement through marches, sit-ins, boycotts, and demonstrations that profoundly and positively affected America's attitudes toward race relations. He was presented the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964.

Benjamin Banneker (February 15, 1980)

In 1753, Banneker constructed the first wooden striking clock made in America. At age 60 he was chosen by George Washington to help lay out blueprints for the Capitol in Washington, D.C.

Whitney Moore Young, Jr. (January 30, 1981)

Whitney Moore Young, Jr., served for 10 years as the executive director of the National Urban League. In 1969, he received the nation's highest civilian honor — the Medal of Freedom.

Jackie Robinson (August 2, 1982)

Jackie Robinson broke the Major League Baseball color barrier in 1947. After retirement from baseball in 1956, he remained active in civil rights and youth activities. In 1962, he became the first African American inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame.

Scott Joplin (June 9, 1983)

A composer and pianist, he was the "King of Ragtime," fighting for recognition of ragtime as a significant genre in modern music. Some 50 years after his death, he was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for his ragtime opera *Treemonisha*.

Dr. Carter G. Woodson (February 1, 1984)

A prominent historian and the son of former slaves from Virginia, Woodson is credited with starting the observance of Negro History Week in 1926.

Mary McLeod Bethune (March 5, 1985)

A noted educator and social activist, Bethune was an advisor to President Franklin D. Roosevelt. She founded the National Council of Negro Women in 1935.

Sojourner Truth (February 4, 1986)

Born into slavery, Isabella Baum Free went to live in New York City after acquiring freedom. In 1843, she changed her name to Sojourner Truth and began traveling and lecturing on women's rights and the evils of slavery. She was considered one of the greatest orators of her time.

Jean Baptiste DuSable (February 20, 1987)

A pioneer and entrepreneur, DuSable was the first settler in the community that was known as the cornerstone of America's heartland — Chicago. The stamp was issued during the city's sesquicentennial.

James Weldon Johnson (February 2, 1988)

Johnson was noted as a lawyer, educator, and writer. His composition "Lift Every Voice and Sing" is sung today as the Black National Anthem.

Phillip Randolph (February 3, 1989)

An eloquent spokesperson for civil rights and minority labor, Randolph organized the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters. After 10 years of fierce struggle, he achieved the first union contract signed by a white employee and an African-American leader.

#### Ida B. Wells (February 1, 1990)

Wells devoted her life to educating people about the horrors of discrimination and lynching.

### Jan E. Matzeliger (September 15, 1991)

Matzeliger's invention, the shoe-lacing machine, patented in 1883, revolutionized the shoemaking industry and made mass-produced shoes a reality in America.

#### W.E.B. Du Bois (January 31, 1992)

Critic, editor, scholar, author, civil rights leader, and one of the most influential African Americans of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, Du Bois was one of the founders of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) in 1909.

#### Percy Lavon Julian (January 29, 1993)

Julian won fame for his work as a research chemist. He synthesized cortisone for arthritis, a drug for glaucoma, and progesterone. In 1990, he was inducted into the National Inventors Hall of Fame.

### Dr. Allison Davis (February 1, 1994)

A psychologist and educator, Davis served on the President's Commission on Civil Rights and was vice chairman of the Department of Labor's Commission Manpower Retraining during the Johnson and Nixon Administrations. He was a Fellow of the Academy of Arts and Sciences and of the National Academy of Education.

### Bessie Coleman (April 27, 1995)

Coleman was the first woman to earn an international aviation license and the world's first licensed African American aviator.

### Ernest E. Just (February 1, 1996)

Known primarily for his research in marine biology, Just pioneered experiments in the process of the fertilization of marine invertebrates. He also studied the fundamental role of the cell surface in the development of organisms.

#### Benjamin O. Davis, Sr. (January 28, 1997)

Davis distinguished himself in a long military career that saw him become the nation's first African-American Brigadier General. He was a driving force in the eventual integration of the U.S. armed forces.

### Madam C. J. Walker (January 28, 1998)

Walker was an early 20<sup>th</sup> century beauty product pioneer and one of the nation's first female millionaires. An early advocate of women's economic independence and empowerment, her hair products manufacturing company employed thousands of women as sales agents and beauty consultants.

#### Malcolm X (El-Hajj Malik El-Shabazz) (January 20, 1999)

In the late 1950s Malcolm X emerged as a major spokesperson for African Americans. He was both a brilliant scholar and a fiery orator whose persuasive and passionate views helped define the debate on race relations.

### Patricia Roberts Harris (January 27, 2000)

An extraordinary leader, committed public servant, and champion of civil rights, Harris dedicated her life to improving the quality of life for all Americans. She was the first African-American woman to hold a U.S. ambassadorship and the first African-American woman to serve as a member of a presidential Cabinet.

### Roy Wilkins (January 24, 2001)

Wilkins advocated tirelessly for racial equality. In 1931 Wilkins joined the NAACP and led the organization from 1955 to 1977 as executive secretary and executive director. Under his leadership, the NAACP campaigned for the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Voting Rights Act of 1965, and the Fair Housing Act of 1968. Wilkins helped organize the August 1963 March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom, during which he also delivered a speech.

This month we celebrate Black History Month reflecting on the progress, richness, and diversity of African-American achievements.

Although February is devoted to Black History Month, every month is a celebration as we continually pay homage to the African Americans who were so instrumental in shaping America's history.

This year, the Postal Service's honoree for the *Black Heritage* commemorative stamp series is Roy Wilkins. He joins 23 other Honorees in the Postal Service's *Black Heritage* series, which salutes outstanding African-American activists, theorists, writers, educators, and leaders.

Roy Wilkins advocated tirelessly for racial equality. In 1931, he joined the NAACP and led the organization from 1955 to 1977 as executive secretary and executive director. Under his leadership, the NAACP campaigned for the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Voting Rights Act of 1965, and the Fair Housing Act of 1968. Wilkins helped organize the August 1963 March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom, during which he also delivered a speech.

Other notable Americans in the series include Harriet Tubman, Martin Luther King, Jr., Jackie Robinson, Carter G. Woodson, Mary McLeod Bethune, Bessie Coleman, Ernest E. Just, Benjamin O. Davis, Sr., Madam C. J. Walker, Malcolm X, and Patricia Roberts Harris who was honored in January 2000.

African Americans have played a vital role in the shaping of America's history, and the U.S. Postal Service is committed to educate and inform America regarding their achievements and contributions.

There have been numerous e-mail rumors and newspaper articles stating that the U.S. Postal Service will discontinue its long-standing *Black Heritage* stamp series. That is absolutely untrue! It is unfortunate such rumors have spread. We are sincerely committed to honoring African Americans on stamps: given the popularity and importance of the *Black Heritage* stamps, there are no plans to discontinue the series.

Learning about our history and notable African Americans through stamps can help us learn more about today's world and ourselves.

We encourage children and adults to continually learn about black history and African Americans on stamps. There is a phenomenal story behind every commemorative stamp — stories that can take us back in time to learn about the greatest Americans.

Stamps can also take us back in time and help us relive moments in the past — moments that we cherish.

For more than 200 years the Postal Service has been a shining example of a public service institution that American people have come to rely on and trust. But in many ways, it's our commemorative stamp program that best connects the Postal Service with the American people.

This month, we hope children and adults of all ages will be participating in Black History Month activities around the country.

Du Bois, Bessie Coleman, Ernest E. Just, Benjamin O. Davis, Sr., Madam C.J. Walker, Malcolm X (El-Hajj Malik El-Shabazz), and Patricia Roberts Harris, who was honored in January 2000.

Born in St. Louis, Missouri, on August 30, 1901, Wilkins was raised in the home of an aunt and uncle living in St. Paul, Minnesota. He graduated from the University of Minnesota in 1923, receiving a B.A. in Sociology with a minor in journalism. On September 8, 1981, Wilkins died in New York City at the age of 80.

Wilkins joined the NAACP in 1931 as assistant executive secretary. He led the NAACP from 1955 to 1977 as executive secretary and executive director. In 1934, Wilkins put his editorial talent to work for the NAACP, succeeding W.E.B. Du Bois as editor of *The Crisis* magazine, holding that position for 15 years.

Wilkins advocated nonviolent means and the use of the legal system to achieve racial equality and to advance the rights of African Americans. Under his leadership, the NAACP campaigned for the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Voting Rights Act of 1965, and the Fair Housing Act of 1968. Along with other civil rights leaders, Wilkins helped organize the August 1963 March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom, during which he also delivered a speech.

In 1964, he was awarded the NAACP's Spingarn Medal, its highest award honoring outstanding achievement by an African American. Other awards he received include the Freedom House Award, Theodore Roosevelt Distinguished Service Medal, Presidential Medal of Freedom, Zale Award, and the Russwurm Award of the National Newspaper Publishers Association. A Roy Wilkins Memorial was constructed in 1995 in St. Paul, Minnesota.

The Postal Service continues its commitment to honoring the historical achievements and contributions of African Americans. The *Black Heritage* stamp series is very popular and, given its significant educational importance, will continue in the future.

### **Participation of Public Officials**

Black History Month events are a perfect opportunity to involve elected public officials in an important and positive local event. They are likely to have a keen interest in the event, as it provides elected representatives a chance to interact with constituents in a friendly, civic setting with secured media coverage.

You are encouraged to reach out directly to your federal, state, and local elected officials. Government Relations representatives are available to assist you in coordinating political involvement and would be pleased to help in any way.

This Black History Month Community Relations Tool Kit contains simple guidelines, sample letters, a suggested invitation list, and the names and telephone numbers of your Government Relations contacts.

Before the Event

**Send a written invitation** 4 to 6 weeks before the event to your two U.S. Senators, your congressional representatives, your state governor, and the mayor of your community. Please include any other local elected officials you feel would be appropriate. The local postmaster should sign the invitations.

**Follow up** the written invitation with a telephone call to the elected official's scheduler within a week if you have not received a reply. You may need to call more than once.

**Keep in touch** with all elected officials who respond. If asked, provide updated information to the elected official's staff as it becomes available (i.e., who else is participating, where and when to meet, what his or her role will be, etc.) Stress that remarks should be brief and limited to the unveiling of the *Roy Wilkins* and *Black Heritage* stamps and recognition of the role the U.S. Postal Service continually plays in celebrating African-American history with stamps.

**Include names** of all participating elected officials on the "official program" as honored guests, and mention them in all media advisories.

**Provide a courtesy copy** of the program to the elected official in advance.

After the Event

**Send a written thank-you** letter to all elected officials who participated in the ceremony, expressing your appreciation.

**Provide copies** of any newspaper articles about the event to their offices. Even though they might see those articles on their own, you can take the opportunity to remind them of the press coverage the event received.

**Provide a supply of extra cachets** with the special cancellation, if applicable, to elected officials, even to those who could not attend. These make great give-aways and serve as a positive reminder of the event.

**Obtain and frame a photo** of the elected official posing beside the stamp image and make an appointment to present it in person, if possible. A matted, well-framed photograph stands a good chance of being hung on the wall of the official's office, again serving as a positive reminder of the event.

**Keep in touch** with your elected officials. Good relationships are built over time.

# Missing Children Poster Display Instructions

Please display this poster prominently on bulletin boards in retail lobbies of main post offices, classified stations, and branches. Operators of contract postal units may display this poster at their option.

Companion posters, authorized for display on bulletin boards maintained by employee organizations, appear periodically in *The Postal Record*, a publication for members of the National Association of Letter Carriers.

This poster is published in cooperation with the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children, the United States Department of Justice, and the National Association of Letter Carriers. Information appearing on this poster is selected solely by NCMEC.

In addition to *Postal Bulletin* updates, NCMEC distributes information via broadcast fax. Notification of newly reported missing children is sent to designated district "Missing Children" coordinators at fax numbers provided by district managers. Within 24 hours of receipt of a facsimile Missing Children poster, district coordinators should distribute copies to all postal facilities in their districts. Missing Children posters are to be displayed for 30 days in post office lobbies, workroom floor areas, and other postal facilities, unless notification is received (from NCMEC) to remove a particular poster sooner. The broadcast fax network is used to distribute posters and information in only the most urgent cases of missing and exploited children. This system supplements, but does not replace, the missing children information in this *Postal Bulletin*.

Missing Children posters are available to the U.S. Postal Service only as described above. If postal employees are contacted by individuals or local agencies about displaying a sign or poster of a missing child in local post offices, the individual or agency should be politely informed that the U.S. Postal Service displays only those posters provided by NCMEC, because it has been designated by the U.S. Department of Justice to be the national clearinghouse and resource center for missing and exploited children. The individual or agency should then be referred to NCMEC at 1-800-843-5678.

- **A.** Securities, currency, or precious metals in their raw, unmanufactured state are prohibited. Official shipments are exempt from this restriction.
- **B.** Form 2976-A is required for all mail weighing 16 ounces or more, with exceptions noted below. In addition, mailers must properly complete required customs documentation when mailing any potentially dutiable mail addressed to an APO or FPO regardless of weight. The following are exceptions to the requirement for customs documentation on non-dutiable mail that weighs 16 ounces or more:
  - Known mailers are exempt from providing customs documentation on non-dutiable letters, and printed matter weighing 16 ounces or more. (A known mailer is anyone who legally applies a permit imprint to a mailpiece. Mail with meter postage is not considered to be from a known mailer.)
  - All federal, state, and local government agencies are exempt from providing customs documentation on mail addressed to an APO or FPO, except for those APOs/FPOs to which restriction B2 applies.
  - Prepaid mail from military contractors is exempt, providing the mailpiece is endorsed "Contents for Official Use — Exempt from Customs Requirements."
- **B1.** Form 2976 or 2976-A is required. Articles are liable for customs duty and/or purchase tax unless they are bona fide gifts intended for use by military personnel or their dependents. When the contents of a parcel meet these requirements, the mailer must endorse the customs form, "Certified to be a bona fide gift, personal effects, or items for personal use of military personnel and dependents," under the heading, Description of Contents. **Exceptions:** All other exceptions listed in restriction B above are applicable to this restriction.
- **B2.** All federal, state, and local government agencies must complete customs documentation when sending mail addressed to or from this APO or FPO weighing 16 ounces or more.
  - C. Cigarettes and other tobacco products are prohibited.
- **C1.** Obscene articles, prints, paintings, cards, films, videotapes, etc., and horror comics and matrices are prohibited.
  - D. Coffee is prohibited.
- **E1.** Medicines or vaccines not conforming to French laws are prohibited.
- **E2.** Any matter containing religious materials contrary to Islamic faith or depicting nude or seminude persons, pornographic or sexual items, or nonauthorized political materials is prohibited.
- **E3.** Radio transceivers, cordless telephones, global positioning systems, scanners, base stations, and hand-held transmitters are prohibited.
- **F.** Firearms of any type are prohibited in all classes of mail. See definitions of firearms in DMM C024.1.1C. This restriction does not apply to firearms mailed to or by official U.S. government agencies.
- **F1.** Privately owned weapons addressed to an individual are prohibited in any class of mail.
- **F2.** Importation of firearms is restricted to one shotgun and one single shot .22 caliber rifle per individual.

- **G.** Only First-Class letters, Periodicals, and Standard Mail (A) are authorized.
- H. Meats, including preserved meats, whether hermetically sealed or not, are prohibited.
  - H1. Pork or pork by-products are prohibited.

  - J. Parcels may not exceed 108 inches in length and girth combined.
- **K.** Mail that includes in the address the words, "Dependent Mail Section," may consist only of letter mail, newspapers, magazines, and books. No parcel of any class containing any other matter may be mailed to the Dependent Mail section. This restriction does not apply if the address does not include the words "Dependent Mail Section."
  - L. All official mail is prohibited.
  - M. Fruits, animals, and living plants are prohibited.
  - N. Registered mail is prohibited.
- Personal mail addressed to vessels using this number is limited to unregistered First-Class Mail and certified mail. Other classes of mail are prohibited.
  - P. APO is used for the receipt and dispatch of official mail only.
- **Q.** Mail may not exceed 66 pounds, and size is limited to 42 inches maximum length and 72 inches maximum length and girth combined.
- **R.** All alcoholic beverages, including those mailable under DMM C021, are prohibited.

Other meats, bones, skin, hair, feathers, horns or hoofs of hoofed animals, wool samples, tobacco leaves, including chewing and pipe tobacco, snuff, cigars, and cigarettes, or obscene material, including obscene drawings, photographs, films, and carvings, are prohibited. Exception: 200 grams of tobacco per parcel are permitted duty free
- X. Personal mail is limited to First-Class Mail (to include audio cassettes and voice tapes) weighing 13 ounces or less. This limitation does not apply to official mail.
- Y. Mail is limited to First-Class and Priority Mail only. All Periodicals, Standard Mail (A), and Standard Mail (B) (including SAM and PAL) are not authorized. This restriction also applies to official mail.

Effective accounting period (AP) 5, fiscal year (FY) 2001, Handbook F-1, *Post Office Accounting Procedures*, 222.1 and 713.2 are revised to reflect account identifier code (AIC) changes.

AIC 558, Refund Customer Meter Withdrawn, will be used to record remaining funds in a postage meter, which are refunded to the customer when removing a postage meter from service. AIC 526, Refund Customer Meter Postage, is to be used only for spoiled meter strips from customer meters.

# Citibank VISA Travel Charge Card ATM Usage Guidelines

Following are guidelines for using the automated teller machine (ATM) feature of the Citibank VISA travel charge card:

- Citibank charges a fee of 1.25 percent of the withdrawal amount for using the ATM feature of their VISA charge card. This fee is reimbursable and may be claimed when you submit your travel voucher.
- When non-Citibank owned ATMs are used, the banks owning the machines may charge fees. Typically, these fees are included as part of the withdrawal. You may claim these fees when submitting your travel voucher. For example, a withdrawal of \$40 appears on your Citibank VISA statement as \$41.50. You may claim this \$1.50 on your travel voucher.

Both the ATM user fee and the 1.25 percent Citibank ATM fee are reimbursable.

■ Citibank VISA travel charge cards are subject to credit limits. ATM usage is limited to approximately 8.25 percent of your available credit limit. Section 4-2.3.2.1 of Handbook F-15, *Travel and Relocation*, provides guidelines for calculating the amount that you should withdraw from the ATM when you go on official travel. Prompt payment of your entire Citibank VISA charge card maximizes the amount of cash available for your withdrawal.

If you have special circumstances requiring the withdrawal of larger amounts of cash (rent payments while on extended detail, international travel, etc.), contact your district Citibank VISA charge card coordinator to get a *temporary* increase in your credit limit to accommodate your needs.

- Deposits for post office box keys are now recorded in AIC 123, Lobby Services Revenue.
- Refunds for post office box keys and fees are now placed in AIC 535, Refund of Fees — Retail Services.
- Unresolved employee stamp credit overages, placed in a trust fund account over one year, are transferred to AIC 123, Lobby Services Revenue.
- Unresolved cash credit overages, placed in a trust fund over 90 days, are transferred to AIC 123, Lobby Services Revenue.

**Note:** Form 3533, Application and Voucher for Refund of Postage and Fees, will be revised to include refunds for post office box key and fees to AIC 535.

Collection service pickup is available for delivery addresses within the participating Global Express Guaranteed Zip Codes. GXG collection service will be provided when a postal employee goes to a customer's location specifically to deliver or collect mail other than Global Express Guaranteed shipments and the employee is handed a Global Express Guaranteed shipment in addition to other mail to be collected. No pickup fee will be charged when Global Express Guaranteed shipments are picked up during a delivery stop or during a scheduled stop made to collect other mail not subject to a pickup fee. On-call or scheduled pickup services are currently not available for GXG Service.

## **International Rate Restructuring**

The following items — Clerk Reference Card, Retail Talks, Frequently Asked Questions — are provided as a reference to help understand the structural changes in international mail. The Clerk Reference Card, which highlights the major changes in international mail, can be used by Window Clerks as a quick reference (see the Clerk Reference Card on pages 58 and 59). The Retail Talks can be used by supervisors to explain in-depth the changes in international mail. Finally, the Frequently Asked Questions will help to answer customer questions about the changes. The international mail restructuring will be implemented at the same time as the domestic rate change.

#### INTERNATIONAL MAIL RESTRUCTURING

#### FIRST OF THREE SERVICE TALKS

In order to make International Mail Service similar to Domestic Mail Service and to keep rates and regulations simple, International Mail is being restructured. International mail rules and regulations have been difficult for retail clerks as well as customers to understand. Soon the service you get will depend only on the speed your customers want their items to be delivered. Customers will now have simple choices to mail internationally.

#### THE CATEGORIES AND THE NAMES WILL CHANGE

- Priority Mail Global Guaranteed is now called Global Express Guaranteed (GXG)
- Express Mail International will now be called Global Express Mail (EMS)
- Global Priority Mail (GPM) will remain the same
- Air, LC, and AO Airmail will now be called Global Airmail with two sub-categories:
  - Letter-post
  - Parcel Post
- Surface Categories will now be called Global Economy with two sub-categories:
  - Letter-post
  - Parcel Post

#### **HOW DOES IT WORK?**

For Global Airmail, content distinctions were eliminated by merging Air Letter Class (LC) and Other Articles (AO) into one group called Letter-post. Now for Airmail there will be only two sub-categories, Letter-post and Parcel Post. The one-half ounce rate is eliminated for Letter-post making the starting weight just like domestic. The Economy rate will begin at one pound for Letter-post and five pounds for Parcel Post. For single piece sales there will no longer be a category of service for small packets, printed matter, sheet music and books.

Now prices for services will conform to the speed of the service. The fastest service is most expensive, while the slowest is cheapest.

#### [Back of Clerk Reference Card]

In order to make International Mail Service similar to Domestic Mail Service and to keep rates and regulations simple, International Mail is being restructured. International mail rules and regulations have been difficult for retail clerks as well as customers to understand. Now the service you get will depend only on the speed your customers want their items to be delivered. Customers will now have simple choices to mail internationally.

#### THE CATEGORIES AND THE NAMES WILL CHANGE

- Priority Mail Global Guaranteed is now called Global Express Guaranteed (GXG)
- Express Mail International will now be called Global Express Mail (EMS)
- Global Priority Mail (GPM) will remain the same
- Air, LC, and AO Airmail will now be called Global Airmail with two sub-categories:
  - Letter-post
  - Parcel Post
- Surface will now be called Global Economy with two sub-categories:
  - Letter-post
  - Parcel Post

#### **HOW DOES IT WORK?**

For Global Airmail, content distinctions were eliminated by merging Air Letter Class (LC) and Other Articles (AO) into one group called Letter-post. Now for Airmail there will only be two sub-categories, Letter-post and Parcel Post. The one-half ounce rate is eliminated for Letter-post making the starting weight just like domestic. The Economy rate will begin at one pound for Letter-post and five pounds for Parcel Post. For single piece sales there will no longer be a category of service for small packets, printed matter, sheet music and books.

For customers who used our printed matter rates, for books, sheet music, and related merchandise samples the M-Bag option will be offered with no minimum weight restrictions. Maximum weight is still 66 pounds per bag.

**GXG – now accepts** both documents and non-documents (merchandise).

Special services that were eliminated are — Special Delivery and Special Handling.

#### LET'S TALK RETAIL

#### INTERNATIONAL MAIL RESTRUCTURING

#### SECOND OF THREE SERVICE TALKS

The current content-based structure of international mail service is confusing to both customers and postal employees. A customer could send a four-pound package under the current system by 12 different services. By simplifying the services offered, customers will have a better understanding of what service they will receive. So, the content-based system is being replaced with a speed-based system of mailing.

#### **GLOBAL AIRMAIL**

The most significant change is for letters and printed matter which will now be called Global Airmail. For letters one major change is in the weight category. The one-half ounce rate is eliminated. Now all international letter mail will be based on a one-ounce rate. The other major change is the addition of two more rate groups for international mail for items weighing over one ounce. There is a rate for Canada and Mexico, Japan, Australia/New Zealand, Europe, and the rest of the world, a total of five rate groups.

#### **TWO CATEGORIES**

There are only two sub-categories of Global Airmail: Letter-post and Parcel Post.

Letter-post can contain letters as well as merchandise and letters. Be sure to check the International Country Listings (ICLs) in the *International Mail Manual* (IMM) to be certain that letters and merchandise can be mixed to a particular country. Custom forms will not change. You will still use the PS Form 2976 (green) for Letter-post mail, as required for customs and Aviation Security. As previously mentioned there will no longer be a content specific rate. Small packet, printed matter, publisher's periodicals, books, and sheet music have been eliminated. Those specific items can use Letter-post or Parcel Post to mail. In addition to that, customers who mail publisher's periodicals, sheet music or books can still use the M-Bag if they wish. The minimum weight for the M-Bag has been eliminated.

Parcel Post is primarily designed to accommodate larger shipments that exceed Letter-post size and weight limits. It also allows the sender to obtain optional services such as insurance coverage and return receipt, which are otherwise not available. The conditions for parcel post are unchanged.

#### **SPECIAL SERVICES**

The regulations and requirements for some special services will not change. Registered mail, Recorded Delivery, etc. will still be available for Letter-post. Insurance will be available for Parcel Post. Restrictions apply. Please consult the IMM.

Special Delivery and Special Handling for international mail have been eliminated.

### **CUSTOMER SATISFACTION**

With the restructuring of international services the price of the service will be in line with the actual cost of the service. For our customers this means that the speed that they want the article to arrive will depend on the actual cost of providing the service. For the retail employee the changes will eliminate different sub-categories of mail that took time to explain and understand. No longer will we need to use endorsements for "small packets" or "printed matter" to identify the contents of the package.

QUESTION: What is the main difference in service that restructuring has allowed us to provide our customers?

**ANSWER:** Restructuring of international mail now allows us to charge for the speed of service instead of the contents of the article mailed. This provides our customers an easier to understand explanation of the service options available to them, and allows them to choose the most convenient and economical service to meet their mailing needs. They can now choose what they need by speed and price, getting the best value for their mailing needs.

NEW RATES AND SERVICES WILL GO INTO EFFECT THE SAME TIME DOMESTIC RATES CHANGE.

#### LET'S TALK RETAIL

#### INTERNATIONAL MAIL RESTRUCTURING

#### THIRD OF THREE SERVICE TALKS

#### WHY THE CHANGE?

The structure of international mail has changed to provide our customers with simple choices to mail their international letters and packages. Instead of a content-based mailing system, which charged the customer by the contents of the mail piece, the system was changed to reflect speed-based pricing. The new restructuring also recognizes the costs of mailing to different destinations so additional rate groups were added.

For expedited services, Global Express Mail (EMS) offers great value — combining tracking, insurance and expedited handling for a reasonable price. Customers needing a guaranteed service should use Global Express Guaranteed (GXG). For impactful economical delivery, customers should use Global Priority Mail (GPM).

#### **GLOBAL ECONOMY (SURFACE)**

Global Economy mail is sent by surface transportation (i.e., boat). Global Economy includes Letter-post and Parcel Post and are subject to the same requirements and conditions of mailing as Global Airmail Letter-Post and Parcel Post items. Economy is a service to recommend when delivery time is not a factor in the shipping decision.

The major change for Global Economy mail is that single piece Parcel Post rates begin at five pounds. Customers can send any weight item they want, but the Parcel Post rate begins at five pounds. The reason why we have done this is because the cost for lower weight items would price surface parcel service above the faster air service. We encourage you to recommend to customers who wish to send items — weighing five pounds or less — via Economy Parcel Post to use Global Airmail. They will get better service at a better price. The single piece rates for Economy Letter-post service begins at one pound for the same reason.

#### **CUSTOMER SATISFACTION**

Our customers now have simpler and easier choices to make when they mail their letters and packages to foreign destinations.

#### **EMPLOYEE SATISFACTION**

Now customers can present an article to mail to a foreign country and you won't have to ask numerous questions to find out what's inside their piece or to find them the best rate. With just a very few inquiry questions, you will be able to explain to the customers their options of mailing and special services. Then the customers can decide in a very short time the service(s) they want and how fast they want the article to arrive. It will take less time to complete an international transaction because the customers have fewer and clearer choices to make. By keeping the service simple we will improve customer satisfaction, and promote return business.

QUESTION: A customer presents a parcel for mailing to an international destination. What service would you offer?

**ANSWER:** By using G.I.S.T. you will be able to determine the needs of the customer. Since our services are based on speed instead of content, you will be able to determine the best service to meet your customers' needs. Use your knowledge of the services to suggest how they could send their article, and then let them decide on the speed that they would like their article delivered.

REMINDER: INTERNATIONAL RATES AND RESTRUCTURE WILL BE IMPLEMENTED AT THE SAME TIME DOMESTIC RATES CHANGE.

#### FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

#### INTERNATIONAL RESTRUCTURING

QUESTION: Why has the Postal Service changed the classification for international mail?

**ANSWER:** The current content-based structure of international mail service is confusing to both customers and postal employees. A customer could send a four-pound package under the current system by 12 different services. The content-based system is being replaced with a speed-based system of mailing. Customers will now have simple choices to mail internationally based on price and speed, not content.

QUESTION: How many classes of service are there?

**ANSWER:** There are now five categories of service:

- 1. Global Express Guaranteed (GXG)
- 2. Global Express Mail (EMS) formerly Express Mail International Service
- 3. Global Priority Mail (GPM)
- 4. Global Airmail both letters and parcels (Letter-post and Parcel Post)
- 5. Global Economy (formerly surface mail) both letters and parcels (Letter-post and Parcel Post)

QUESTION: When I mail an Airmail letter, how will it differ from the way I sent it before?

**ANSWER:** Letters can be sent Letter-post by Global Airmail. One major change is the one-half ounce weight rate is eliminated. The other major change is the addition of two more rate groups for items weighing over one ounce.

QUESTION: How will the new one-ounce rate compare with the old one-ounce rate?

**ANSWER:** The new one-ounce rate of 80 cents is actually cheaper than the old one-ounce rate of \$1.00. However, the new one-ounce rate of 80 cents is more than the old half-ounce rate of 60 cents.

QUESTION: What about content-based services I use now. What will change?

**ANSWER:** Small packet, printed matter, publisher's periodicals, books, and sheet music have been eliminated. These specific items can be mailed via Letter-post or Parcel Post. Customers who mail publisher's periodicals, sheet music, or books can still use M-Bag service if they wish. The minimum weight for M-Bag service has been eliminated.

**QUESTION:** What will change when I send a parcel?

**ANSWER:** The major change in Parcel Post rates is for Global Economy (surface) service. Parcel Post Global Economy rates begin at five pounds. Customers can send any weight item they want, but the Parcel Post rate begins at five pounds. The reason why we have done this is because the cost for lower weight items would price surface parcel service above the faster air service. The single piece rates for Economy Letter-post service begins at one pound for the same reason.

**QUESTION:** Have any Special Services been changed?

**ANSWER:** The regulations and requirements for some special services will not change. Registered Mail, Recorded Delivery, etc. will still be available for Letter-post. Insurance will be available for Parcel Post. However, Special Delivery and Special Handing for international mail have been eliminated.

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The Postal Service will issue a 34-cent definitive *Statue of Liberty* stamp in two large coil formats in Washington, DC, on January 7, 2001 (no ceremony). The stamp, designed by Derry Noyes of Washington, DC, based on a photograph by Paul Hardy of New York, NY, goes on sale nationwide January 8, 2001.

The Statue of Liberty, a gift of friendship from the people of France to the people of the United States, has become a symbol of freedom and democracy. Located in New York Harbor, the statue was dedicated on October 28, 1886, and designated a National Monument on October 15, 1924.



#### **Pictorial Cancellations Announcement**

As a community service, the Postal Service offers pictorial cancellations to commemorate local events celebrated in communities throughout the nation. A list of events for which pictorial cancellations are authorized appears below. If available, the sponsor of the pictorial cancellation appears in italics under the date. Also provided, as space permits, are illustrations of those cancellations that were reproducible and available at press time.

People attending these local events may obtain the cancellation in person at the temporary post office station established there. 





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#### **USPS Supports the National Drunk and Drugged Driving Prevention Month**

#### You Drink and Drive, You Lose!

Reducing alcohol-related traffic fatalities is one of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's (NHTSA) top priorities. The national goal is to lower the death toll to no more than 11,000 by the year 2005. To meet this challenge, NHTSA launched the *You Drink & Drive, You Lose!* campaign as part of National Drunk and Drugged Driving (3D) Prevention Month.

#### Impaired Driving Is an American Tragedy

In 1999, nearly 16,000 people were killed as a result of alcohol-related crashes. More than 300,000 were injured. That's one person dead every 33 minutes and one person injured every 2 minutes. An estimated 1.5 million people were arrested. In fact, the average American has a 30 percent chance of being killed or injured by an impaired driver during his or her lifetime. And while the number of alcohol-related fatalities is at an all-time low, impaired driving is still a leading cause of death for people under the age of 30.



The purpose of *You Drink & Drive, You Lose!* is to help support the hard work already being done nationwide by law enforcement and community leaders to prevent impaired driving in their neighborhoods, cities, counties, and states. The *You Drink & Drive, You Lose!* goal is to enhance national awareness about the deadly toll that impaired driving exacts on America's communities and to generate a greater national urgency to stop the senseless killing and injury on our nation's highways.

#### What Is Impaired Driving and Who Is at Risk?

All drivers risk impairment when consuming alcohol or drugs — whether legal, over-the-counter and prescription medications, or illegal substances such as marijuana, cocaine, or other illicit drugs. The campaign's message is a simple one: Make the right choice — don't drink and drive. Yet, we know that thousands of Americans every year continue to make the wrong choices.

Drunk drivers come in all ages, genders, and backgrounds. But, there are 3 high-risk populations identified as most likely to drive while impaired. *You Drink & Drive, You Lose!* speaks directly to these groups:

- 21- to 34-year-olds.
- Underage drinkers between the ages of 15 and 20.
- Persons with high blood alcohol content and repeat offenders.

#### **How the Campaign Works**

While You Drink & Drive, You Lose! serves as the voice for reaching Americans with this lifesaving message, it is much more than just a public service campaign. You Drink & Drive, You Lose! offers a framework for neighborhoods, cities, counties, and states to develop their own comprehensive impaired-driving prevention programs through the creation of local and national partnerships.

National campaign partners include the International Association of Chiefs of Police, the National Association of Governors' Highway Safety Representatives, the National Sheriffs' Association, the National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives, and Operation C.A.R.E. Many national organizations, including the U.S. Postal Service have signed on to the campaign and are working at the local, state, and national level to stop impaired driving.

#### RURAL CARRIERS

#### **Equipment Maintenance Allowance Schedule for Rural Routes**

In accordance with provisions of Article 9, Section 2.J.3 of the Rural Carrier National Agreement, effective December 30, 2000 (pay period 2-01), the equipment maintenance allowance (EMA) will increase from 38.5 cents per mile to 39.5 cents per mile.

The EMA is now the greater amount of 39.5 cents per mile or a minimum of \$15.80 per day.

#### Auxiliary Rural Carriers, Rural Carrier Reliefs, Rural Carrier Associates, Rural Carrier Part-Time Flexibles, and Auxiliary Assistance

Employees providing auxiliary assistance or serving auxiliary routes under provisions of Article 9, Section 2.J.5, receive an EMA of 39.5 cents per mile or \$4.55 per hour, whichever is greater, not to exceed the amount provided in the special EMA for the route stops and miles.

#### **EMA Rate Schedule**

The EMA rate schedule on pages 84–85 supersedes all previously published EMA schedules for employees receiving EMA.

#### **Optional EMA Rate**

The optional EMA rate, effective November 4, 2000, remains at 65 cents per mile.



## Purchasing and Materials

#### **Managed Voice Services Contract Award**

As part of Purchasing and Materials' supply chain management initiatives, a gain-sharing contract was awarded to SBC Global Services, Inc. on December 5, 2000. The Managed Voice Services (MVS) program is championed by the Headquarters Purchasing Telecom Team and requires SBC to provide audit-type services and to identify and negotiate the best operational efficiencies, rate plans, and services to rapidly reduce local voice and telecommunications costs for the Postal Service across 37,500 sites. SBC has guaranteed the Postal Service an estimated savings of \$15 million in the first 2 years. The contract has a 2-year base with three 1-year options.

The MVS Program Management Office (PMO) will operate from the National Information Systems Support Center (NISSC) in Raleigh, NC. The PMO has been established to support the MVS initiative and provide guidance, direction, and problem resolution services to field offices. Postal Service offices can contact the MVS PMO in Raleigh toll-free at 866-4-PMO-MVS (866-476-6687), by cc:Mail at

MVS-PMO, or Internet e-mail at mvspmo@email.usps.gov. Further procedural correspondence will be forthcoming. In the interim, Postal Service locations are required to contact the PMO for approval prior to changing any local exchange carrier (LEC) providers.

SBC is a leader in supplying and managing voice premises and local exchange communications and has demonstrated through past performance that it can significantly reduce local voice telephone costs. SBC has submitted a comprehensive proposal to the Postal Service to reduce costs quickly and efficiently using master service or volume discount agreements, billing error correction, and facility service optimizations. SBC will, at a minimum, evaluate 2,496 of the Postal Service's largest facilities and determine opportunities for savings at individual sites.

#### **Supply Chain Savings From Copiers**

Supply chain management initiatives are making significant contributions to breakthrough productivity. By combining national copier requirements, Purchasing and Materials has leveraged the Postal Service's buying power to reap huge savings.

On December 20, 2000, the Postal Service formed a strategic partnership with Ricoh Corporation for the purchase of digital copiers and related maintenance nationwide. Ricoh, a multibillion dollar company, is celebrating its 65th year in business and is one of the world's leading suppliers of office automation equipment. Ricoh will be the exclusive national supplier to the Postal Service for digital copiers and related maintenance. This national contract will result in an estimated savings of 65.9 percent in copier equipment costs and 46.4 percent in maintenance expenses, totaling \$7.4 million per year.

Initially, all orders will be placed through the Greensboro Purchasing and Materials Service Center (800-627-7211) for copiers with speeds of 20 to 100 pages per minute. In the future, web-based purchasing will be used for the ordering and tracking of orders throughout the Postal Service. All copiers provided under this contract are network capable and will reduce the need for separate system printers. A *Material Logistics Bulletin* with specific ordering instructions will be issued in the near future.

From December 15, 2000, to January 7, 2001, stock these machines with *both* the nondenominated *Statue of Liberty* and *Flowers* stamps *and* the existing 33-cent booklet. Beginning January 7, replace the 33-cent booklets with the *Statue of Liberty* and *Flowers* stamps.

#### Refunds for PC Postage Products

With increased usage of PC Postage ™ products, and the exit of one PC Postage provider from the market (Estamp), Postal Service employees are beginning to receive more questions about the refund process for unused postage.

Refund procedures associated with PC Postage products were published in *Postal Bulletin* 22004 (8-12-99). Post offices must *not* provide refunds to PC Postage customers for unused postage. Customers must send mailpieces or labels with unused (unmailed) indicia to the provider for refund.

The unused postage value remaining on a PC Postage Postal Security Device (PSD) that is surrendered and withdrawn from service is also refunded by the product provider. The registered user must notify the product service provider of the intent to withdraw the PSD. After receipt of the PSD and verification, the refund will be issued through the registered user's provider.
